

# **MHS Receives Important Book Donation**

MHS recently received a donation of 45 softbound books from the estate of James and Marie Kaiser. The limited-edition book, titled "Crown Lumber Company and The Early Growth of Mukilteo," was written in 1990 by James G. Kaiser.

James George Kaiser was born March 8, 1907, in Mukilteo to John and Elizabeth (Gessner) Kaiser. James was raised in Mukilteo and graduated from Everett High School in 1925. He went to work at the Crown Lumber Company at an early age and earned enough money to attend the University of Washington. He graduated from the University of Washington, receiving his Bachelors Degree in 1931 and Masters in 1932, both in Forestry. He worked for the U.S. Forest Service for 17 years in Washington, Colorado, and California. He then




Cover of James G. Kaiser books donated to MHS

worked for the Washington State Land Office (now known as the Department of Natural Resources) and eventually retired as manager of the Grays Harbor Log Scaling Bureau.

James married Marie Antoinette "Leona" Josh in 1936, in Denver, Colorado. Born June 14, 1913, Leona was the daughter of Howard Leon Josh and Marie Miralda "Mildred" Poirier. Born October 15. 1883, Howard Josh was a well-known Mukilteo pioneer who worked for the

Crown Lumber Company. He was the captain of the company's tugboat and also skippered the "Noreen," one of the boats that took Mukilteo kids to high school in Everett before the road was built. He built the Eagle Lunch Room on the property next to the Mukilteo ferry terminal that later became the Ferry Lunch, Taylor's Landing, and eventually Ivar's. He was also manager of Mukilteo's baseball team.

Leona Josh Kaiser graduated from Everett High School in 1932. She was very active in MHS and authored several historical stories that appear in Opal McConnell's book, "Mukilteo Pictures and Memories." She was a lifetime member of MHS and a lifelong and oldest living member of St. John Catholic Mission in Mukilteo. She was a graduate of the US Power Squadron Seamanship Course, past president of various organizations, and she volunteered with the Girl Scouts in the 1960s.

James and Marie (aka Leona) were Mukilteo Pioneers of the Year in 1990. James died at age 96 on June 1, 2003, and Leona died at age 98 on August 20, 2011. Both are buried at Cypress Lawn Memorial Park in Everett. The books given to MHS were brought to us by Howard L. Josh Jr., executor for their estate. Howard, who lives in Bellingham, is the grandson of Howard Leon Josh described above and the nephew of James G. Kaiser, the book's author. It was the wish of Jim and Leona that the donated books be sold in our gift shop for the benefit of MHS.

# A Message from our President

### In Memoriam



Art Losvar MHS mourns the death of Arthur Losvar, who passed away on September 14 at age 94. Art was born in Mukilteo and was a lifelong resident. He was an enthusiastic member of MHS, along with his wife Connie Fischer Losvar, who was also a lifetime Mukilteo resident. Together they provided many photos and artifacts for the Historical Society's collection and contributed greatly to our knowledge of the town's history. Connie, who died in 2008, was a faithful member of the A-Team, working in Quarters A to help to identify photos and other memorabilia. Art and Connie were named Mukilteo's Pioneers of the Year in 2003. Art was the grandson of Peter Christiansen, the first Mukilteo lighthouse keeper. Art worked for many years at his family business, the Mukilteo Boathouse, which was located next to the lighthouse. An avid and renowned boat racer, Art had set 10 national records by the time he

retired in 2002. MHS sends its condolences to all the Losvar family and assures them that the legacy of Art and Connie remains deeply appreciated and will continue to live on in the mission of MHS.

Joyce Wans MHS is saddened to hear of the death of Joyce Wans on September 29. Joyce was active in the Mukilteo Historical Society, doing highly respected research on early Mukilteo history. She provided numerous well-written historical articles for the MHS newsletter, notably one that established 1860 as the most accepted date for the founding of Mukilteo. She also helped a great deal with some of the first exhibits created in the early 2000s when MHS moved to the light station. When Joyce moved away from Mukilteo, she generously donated her binders of historical research and other materials to MHS where they remain a valuable resource for use in Ouarters A. ٠

### **Cemetery Corner**

I wonder about that big cut-off maple tree in Pioneer Cemetery, the one with the sign on it..

How old is it? Last summer, while on the Garden and Quilt Tour, I visited the garden of the Foster house at the west end of 88<sup>th</sup> Street. In that garden is an enormous maple tree estimated to be 200 years old.

The size of the base of the cemetery maple trunk suggests it may be of similar age. Who knows why it was cut off? Branches may have grown to enormous size and may have been unstable; when I recall the enormous branches of the Foster maple tree, I can imagine that without care they would have become hazardous. Or the heart of the cemetery maple may have rotted.

The ivy may be another clue. The cemetery maple trunk is covered in ivy. Photos of the cemetery from the Holtgeerts family album show that the front part of the cemetery was a sea of ivy before any renovation was attempted. If this ivy had engulfed the old maple tree it may well have killed it. Ivy, by the way, was planted in old cemeteries as a symbol of everlasting life.

When was the sign attached to the tree? From the design of the wooden sign and the style of the lettering, I would guess that it was made in the 1970s-1990s. It seems that the ivy was there when the sign was attached.

The maple trunk and the sign are a part of the cemetery's history that we have no records for, but that history may live in the memory of someone living today. Let me know if you have any information.

## What's up with the Yellow Tape?

Good news! The yellow caution tape surrounding an area of the Mukilteo Light Station (MLS) is finally gone. But wait, why all the fuss?

A casual glance skyward would have revealed a broken antenna atop the wooden pole. Now the antenna has been replaced and the yellow caution tape is no more, not to mention all the orange safety cones.

We know the MLS is home to two **active** United States Coast Guard (USCG) Aids to Navigation. The first, a light encased in a Fresnel Lens which was made by opticians in Paris, France in 1852. Visible for 10-12 miles on a clear night, the signature flash is every 5 seconds (2

"The purpose of a Vessel Traffic Service (VTS) is to provide active monitoring and navigational advice for vessels in particularly confined and busy waterways. VHF-FM communications network forms the basis of most major services. Transiting vessels make position reports to a vessel traffic center by radiotelephone and are in turn provided with accurate, complete, and timely navigational safety information. They encompass a wide range of techniques and capabilities aimed at preventing vessel collisions, rammings, and groundings in the harbor, harbor approach and inland waterway phase of navigation. They are also designed to expedite ship movements, increase transportation system efficiency, and improve all-weather operating capability. The Coast Guard operates 12 Vessel Traffic Centers (VTC): Prince William Sound, Puget Sound, Valdez, Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles/Long Beach, Houston-Galveston, Berwick Bay, Louisville, Saint Mary's River, Port Arthur, Tampa, and New York."

The communication system at the MLS is part of the Puget Sound VTC located at Pier 36 in Seattle. The Puget Sound VTC monitors the Strait of Juan de Fuca, Rosario Strait, Admiralty Inlet and Puget Sound south to Olympia. The MLS system provides valuable communications to/from vessels passing through Possession Sound (Whidbey Island and the coastline of Mukilteo and Everett).

Since 1979, the USCG has cooperated with the Canadian Coast Guard in managing vessel traffic to include areas north of the Strait of Juan de Fuca through Haro Strait to include Vancouver B.C. The relationship with Canada is invaluable in their mission to protect vessels in Puget Sound and the Salish Sea.

In summary, the USCG, the City of Mukilteo and the Mukilteo Historical Society are pleased to cooperate in the preservation and maintenance of the Mukilteo Light Station whose mission is to serve as an Aid to Navigation for all vessels sailing the Possession Sound.

seconds on and 3 seconds off). The light is listed in USCG publications and shown on navigation maps. The MLS has the only active Fresnel Lens in the State of Washington. The second, a foghorn that can be activated by the USCG on those "rare" foggy days. The signature sound is a 3 second blast every 27 seconds.

But did you know that the MLS is also home to a communications system which is part of the USCG Vessel Traffic Service? In the words of the USCG at the Navigation Center website (navcen.uscg.gov):
