MUKILTEO'S PIONEER OF THE YEAR (A HISTORY) by Ann and John Collier

In 1966, the newly formed Mukilteo Historical Society (MHS) organized the first Mukilteo Pioneer Festival as a means of celebrating and honoring the city's history. The festival was so popular and successful (except financially) that it was eventually transformed into today's Mukilteo Lighthouse Festival.

In 1969, the Historical Society began selecting a Man of the Year as part of the festival celebration. Unable to decide between George Losvar and David Burklund, they ended up choosing both. Calling the honor "Man of the Year" became more problematic in 1972 when Clara Pokwinski Kane was selected. So in 1976 the name was changed to Citizen of the Year. Today, the Citizen(s) of the Year are chosen by past honorees. But MHS still wanted a separate category to honor long-time residents of Mukilteo, so in 1982 it began naming Pioneers of the Year. This honor was given to representatives of families who had lived and were active in Mukilteo all their lives, or at least for many decades. Their names are listed on page 3 and on plaques in Quarters B (the gift shop building at the Lighthouse).



Sue Anderson and Sandy Tyler led children's activities to keep families engaged while waiting their turn in the lighthouse. This is a new tradition that will carry over in 2023. Many families played and picnicked together over the weekend which was fun to watch. This was the first year MHS did not participate in the parade, opting to focus on staffing the lighthouse. With the end of the Pioneer of the Year program, it made sense. A week after the Festival, the MHS Advisory Board hosted an ice cream social, a great opportunity for members to meet or see each other after a long break. In January, the Board will reassess meeting in person for general meetings.

Recently, three generations of women related to an assistant lighthouse

keeper in the 1970s toured Quarters B and the lighthouse. They explained how each room was used and where furniture was placed. They plan to return with photos and the missing generation (the wife of the assistant keeper) to tell us more stories.

MHS has been financially healthy despite the pandemic. Thanks to the strengths of Treasurer, Al Friedrich who led the Finance Team and the Board in actively managing spending. The Gift Shop team, led by Tina Saunders, worked together to make impressive profits. The next step is to improve staffing and fill roles for 2023. I look forward to meeting new volunteers.



Two long-term Board Directors will vacate their positions at the end of this year although they will remain in MHS: Eric Richstad and Peter Anderson. Both have agreed to join the Advisory Board. Eric will continue to lead the essav contest for students. Peter will continue to lead the Archives team. MHS ESSAY CONTEST

This one year \$1,500 prize is awarded to the student who submits a winning essay about some aspect of Mukilteo history. The award will be applied to tuition expense in the winner's name to the school selected by the winner. Essays are due next Spring but now is a good time to start.

The winner must be a high school graduating student or equivalent who either lives in the Mukilteo School District, or is the child or grandchild of someone who is a member of the Mukilteo Historical Society. Home schooled students may submit essays provided they will be eligible to enroll in a post-secondary school in the Fall of the contest year. If you know a qualified student, be sure to remind him or her of this opportunity!

CEMETERY CORNER

Mukilteo's Pioneer Cemetery was fenced in perhaps as late as the 1990's. Originally, some plots had picket fences but most did not. The present fence along Webster Street is made of log rails. The gate opens with two moving horseshoes. Not a clang to be heard. It fits the friendly neighborhood atmosphere of our hometown cemetery.

Contrast this humble gate to the original entrance of Evergreen Cemetery in Everett. Down at the northeast corner of the cemetery at 41st and Broadway, a wrought-iron gate once admitted hearses and funeral corteges. Beside the gate is a green, gazebo-like structure called a lych gate; lych is an Old English word meaning corpse. The gate imitates the traditional English churchyard structure where pallbearers rested the coffin and awaited the arrival of the minister. Everett's venerable old cemetery hosted larger funerals than Mukilteo; everything about Evergreen is bigger and older and hence more replete with stories.

A passage through the gate of a cemetery is a step backwards into the stories of that place. No cemetery is immune from the erosion of memory. Memorial Day, and Halloween, too, are occasions for refreshing our local history which is to be carried with us through the gates.
